Language arts plans new program

Plans were completed and approved for a completely new English program to be inaugurated next year. After the first semester of English, all English courses will be electives.

Journalism and speech will receive English credit as elective offerings, along with a wide variety of writing and literature courses.

The adoption of this new program will be the culmination of several years' work and planning by the English department under the chairmanship of Mr. Tom West.

The English department has striven to develop the students' ability to think, express themselves in clear English, and to acquire a taste for good literature. Throughout their three years of English, students are introduced to a wide range of literature, short stories, poetry, essays, novels and contemporary and classical drama. In addition to literature, a strong emphasis was placed on grammar usage and composition. The English teachers sought to continue student-teacher relationships through individual help.

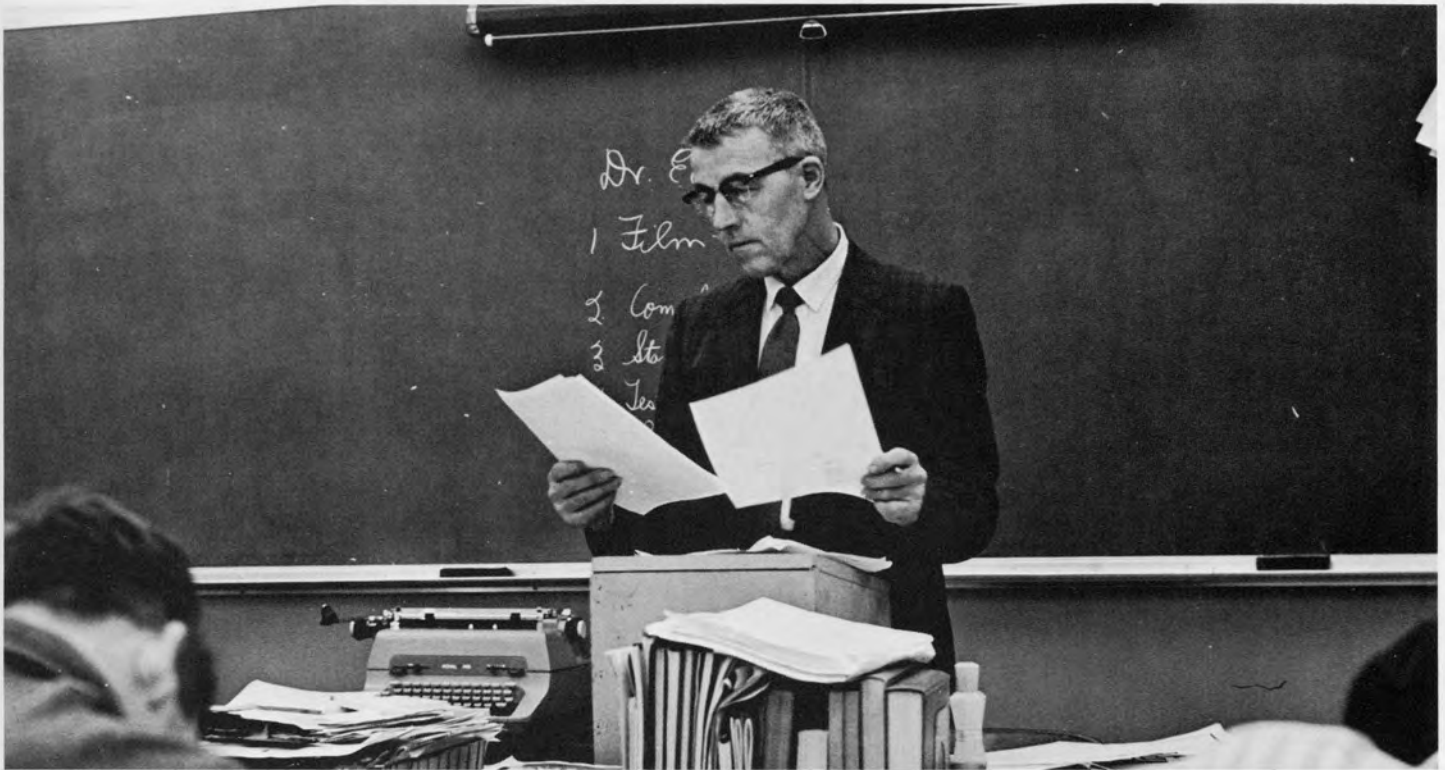

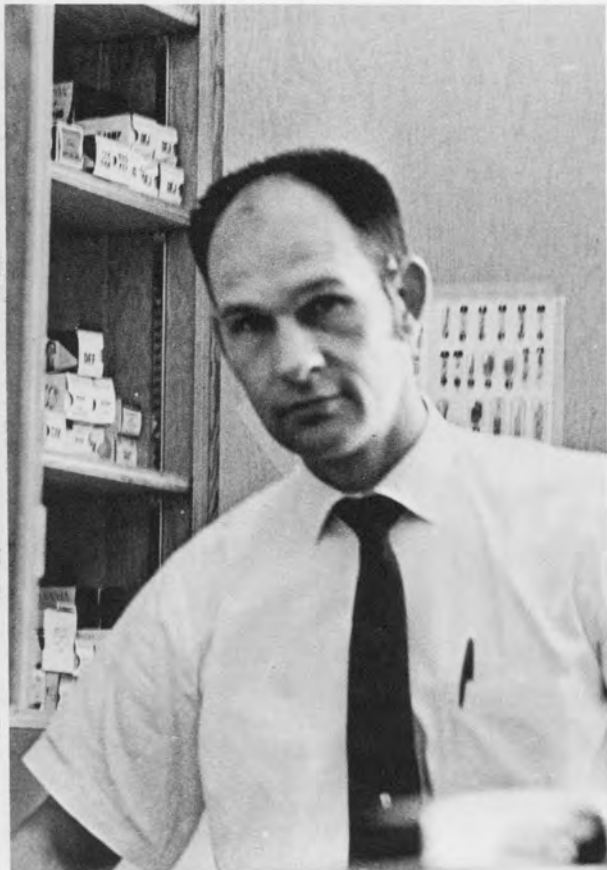

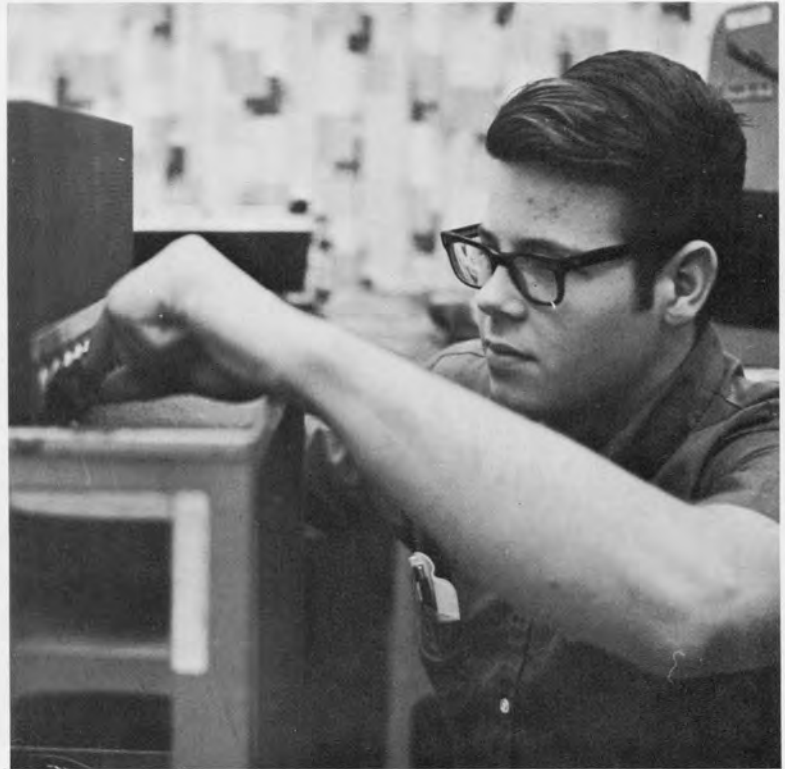

FOREIGN LANGUAGES

German classes have new teacher

Among the teachers added to this year's faculty was talented Miss Wilhelmina Middlehoven, German and French teacher. She took her classes on field trips to the French restaurant "Encore" and the German "Rhine-lander" in Portland.

Miss Adelaide Ponta, Spanish teacher, spent her summer in Europe and showed her slides to her students.

First year language students drilled orally with the use of dialogue and the ALM overhead lingual aids. The second year students began with a complete review of grammar and vocabulary as more written work was introduced.

Improving reading and oral conversation as well as cultural enrichment were the aims of third year classes as students worked to perfect the spoken language and translate fluently. Only French continued the fourth year. Supplementary reading and short stories or poems were included in the class program.

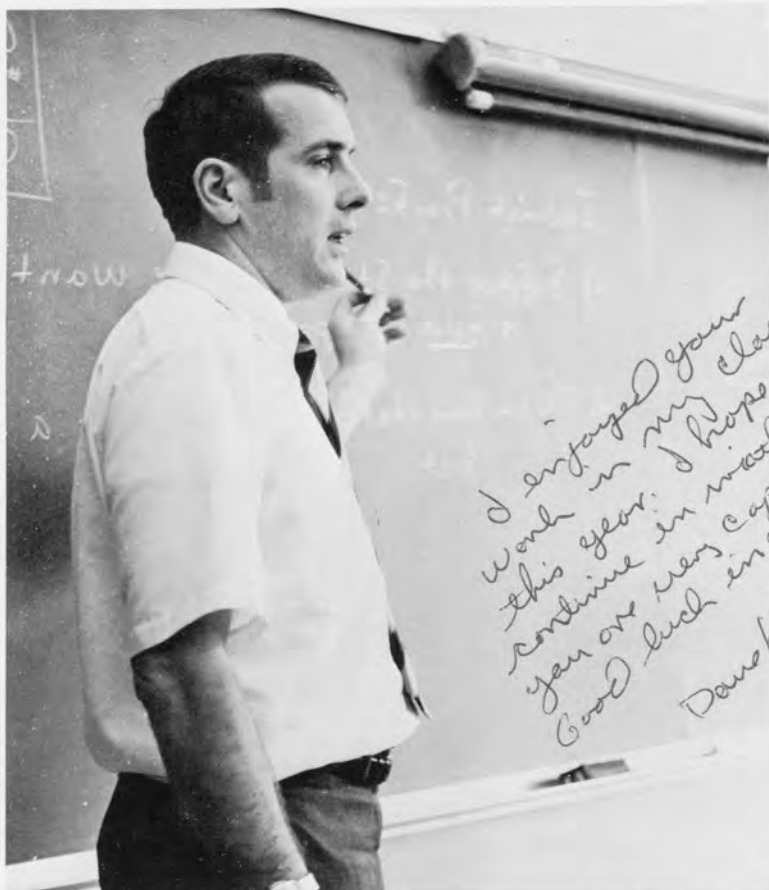

Business education was considered one of the more important vocational areas in the St. Helens Senior High curriculum.

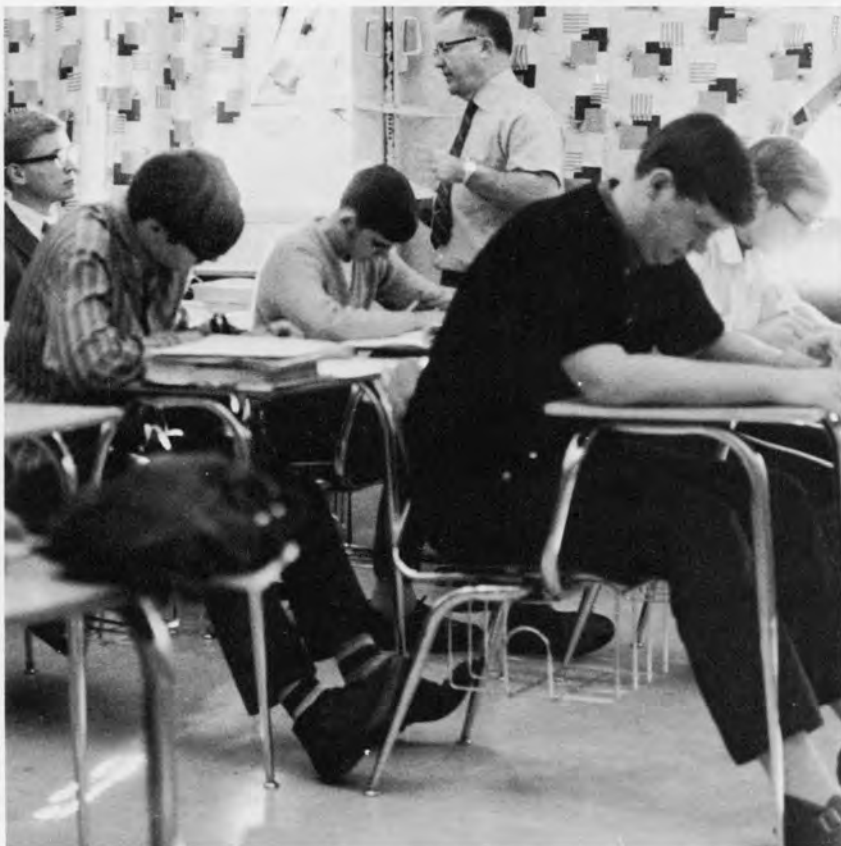
A variety of business courses were offered to students who wish to enter this field. To broaden their knowledge of business, diversified occupation and shorthand classes visited a computer center at the U.S. National Bank in Portland. There, students watched checks being processed through the many occupations in this area, such as key punch operating and programming.

Diversified occupations provided on-the-job work experience. Students attended school four periods a day, and worked the remaining two periods at such jobs as nurses aides, office workers, welders, service station attendants, and clerks.

A banquet was held in the spring honoring the students' employers.



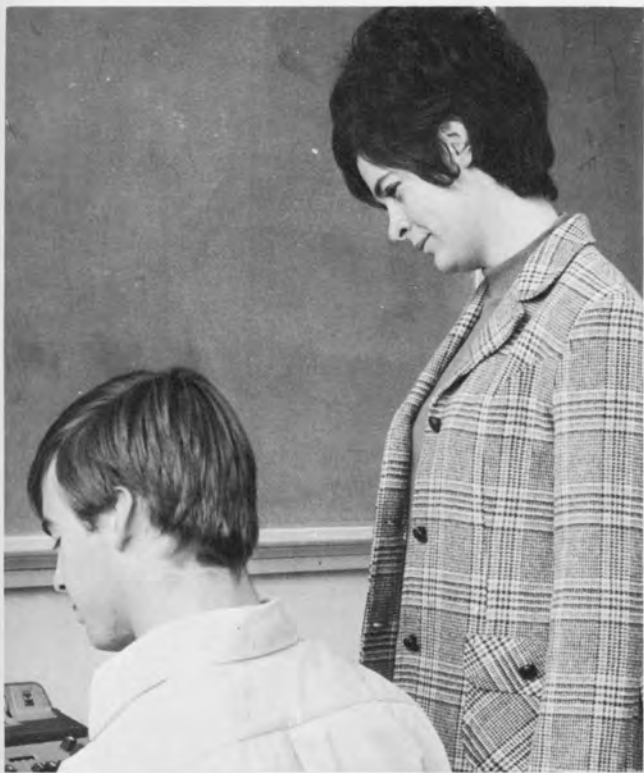

INDUSTRIAL ARTS

Vocational skills gain popularity

The industrial arts department gave boys and interested girls basic vocational training in various fields. Woodshop II, taught by Keith Drake, worked with complex machines and learned to mass produce. Advanced woodshop students mass produced lawn chairs, built the FFA shed, built gun cabinets, and pool cues.

Mechanical drawing classes, instructed by Doug Wilson, learned the development of basic skills which they used later in the year making sheet metal designs and cabinets. Advanced mechanics classes worked on architectural designs and drawing a complete full-size house.

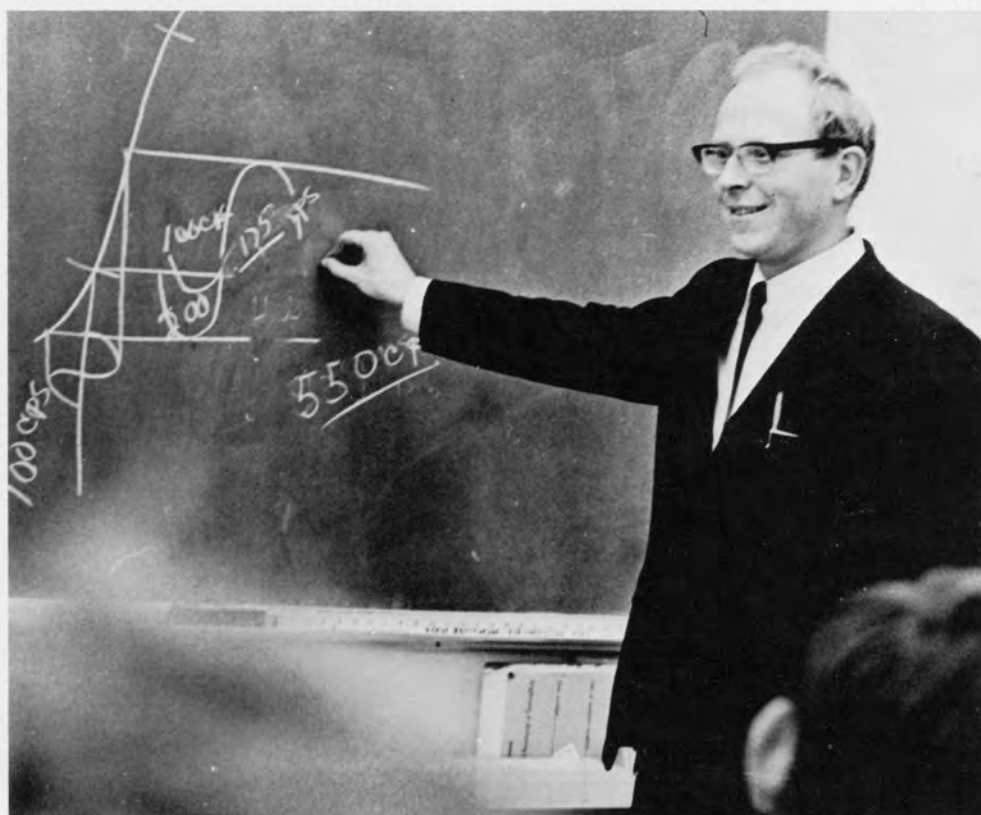

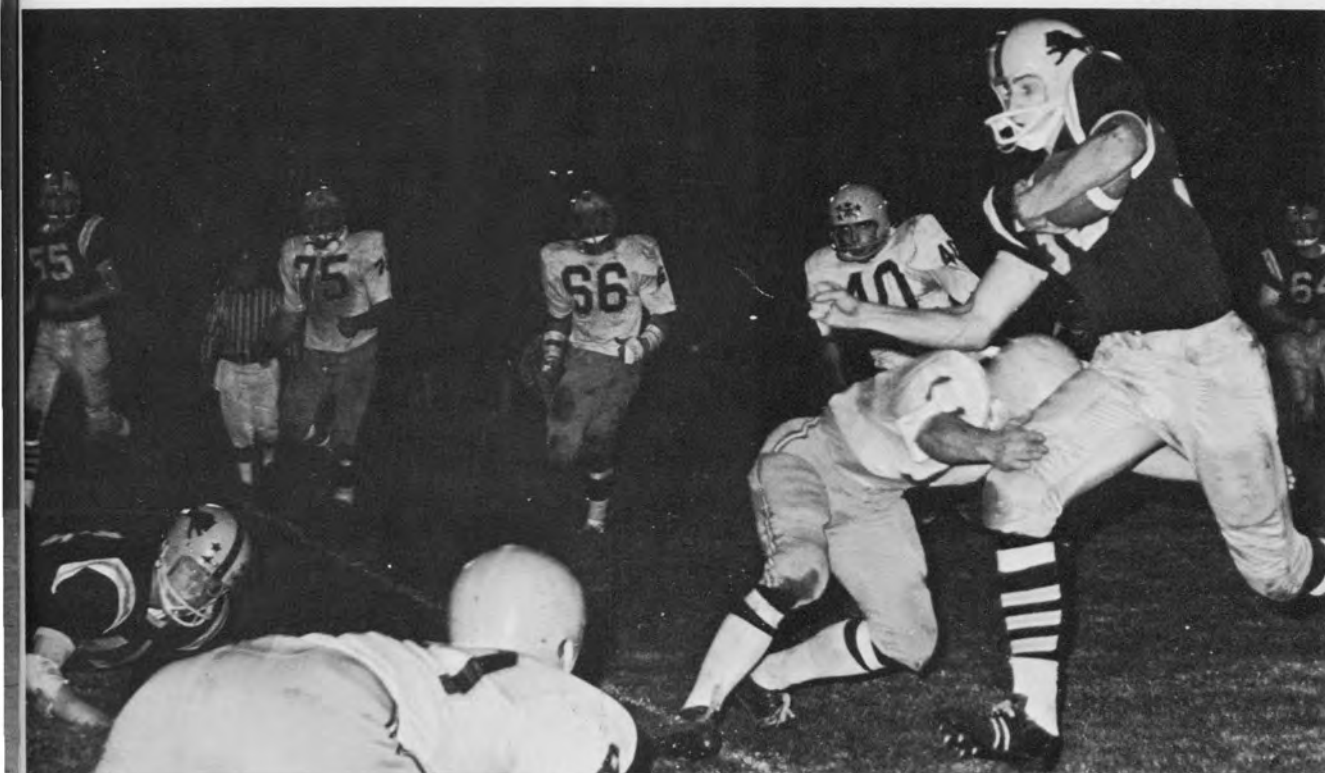

Students participate actively

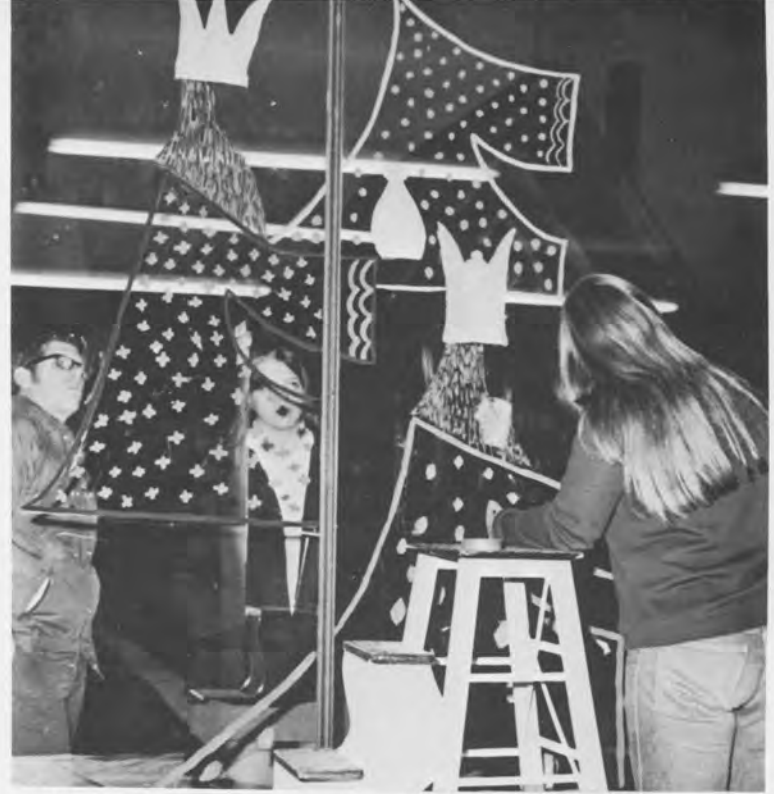
The Delacroix Club, instructed by Lee Clark, demonstrated their spirit by decorating various windows in town with the three wise men, candles, and other Christmas themes.

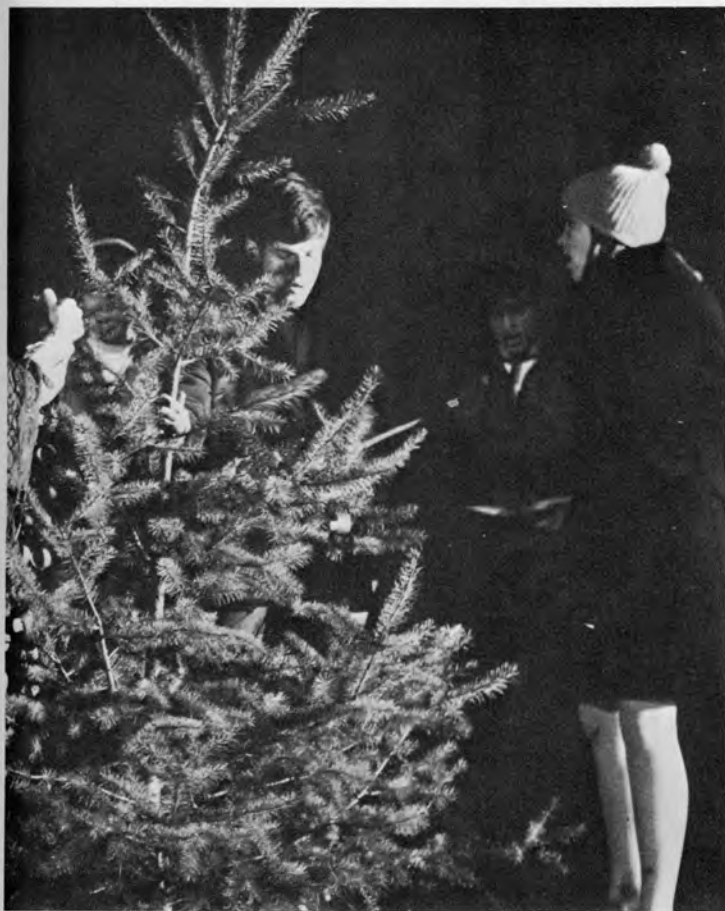

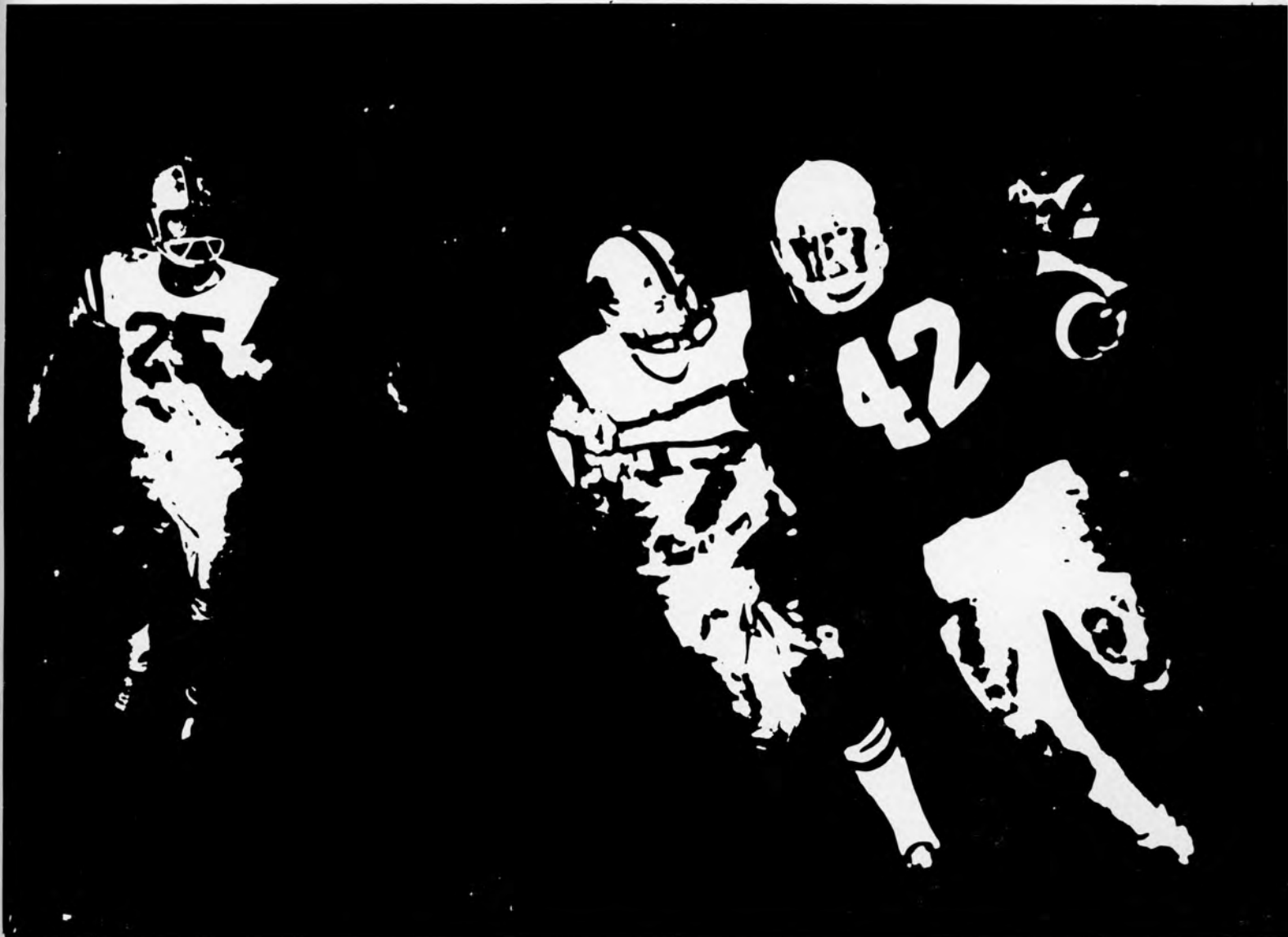

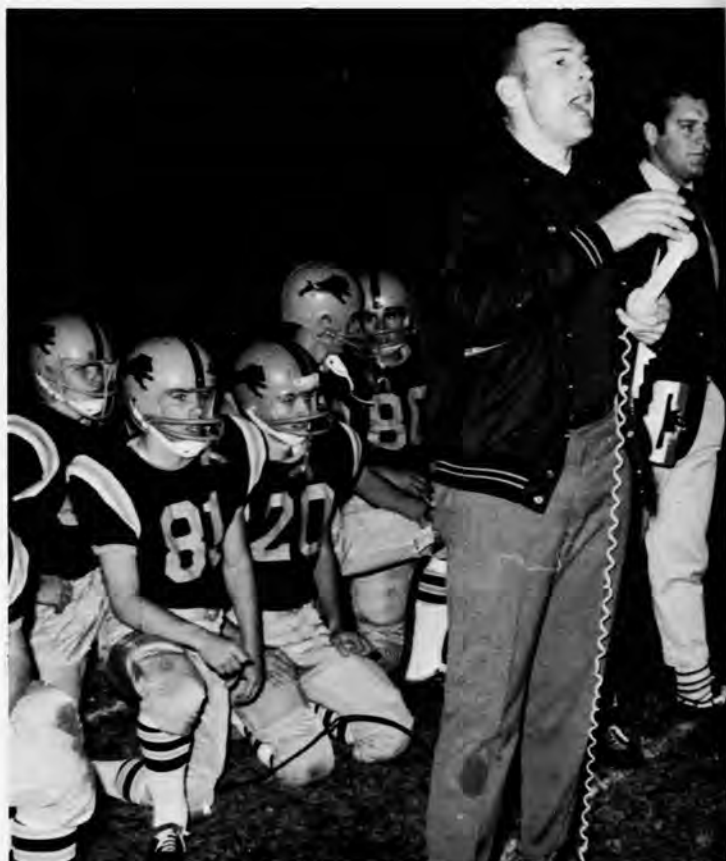
Gridders' season success

Lion swimmers finished the year with the boys' team winning one, losing four and the girls winning two and losing three.

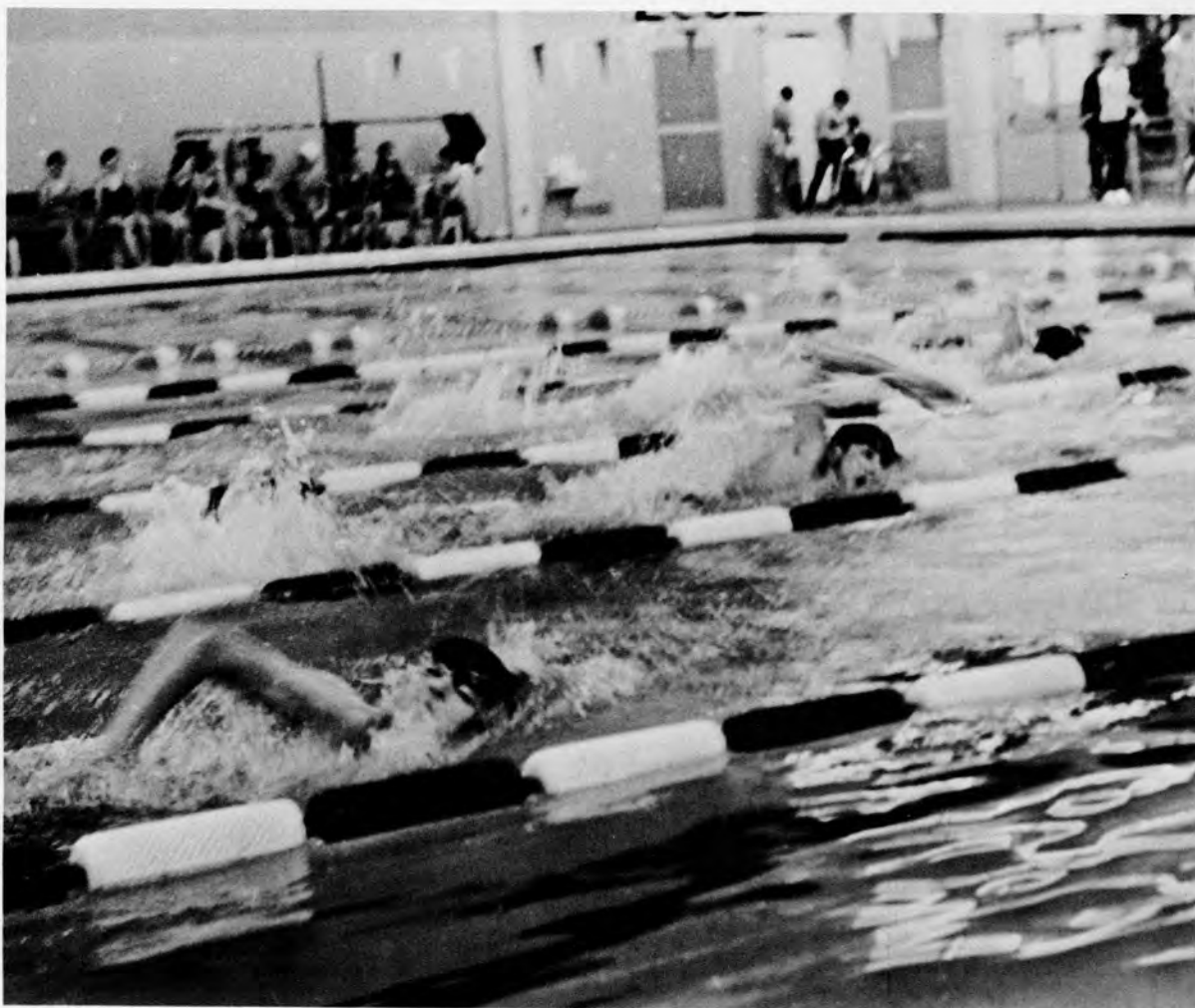

New coach finds team short in size, tall in spunk

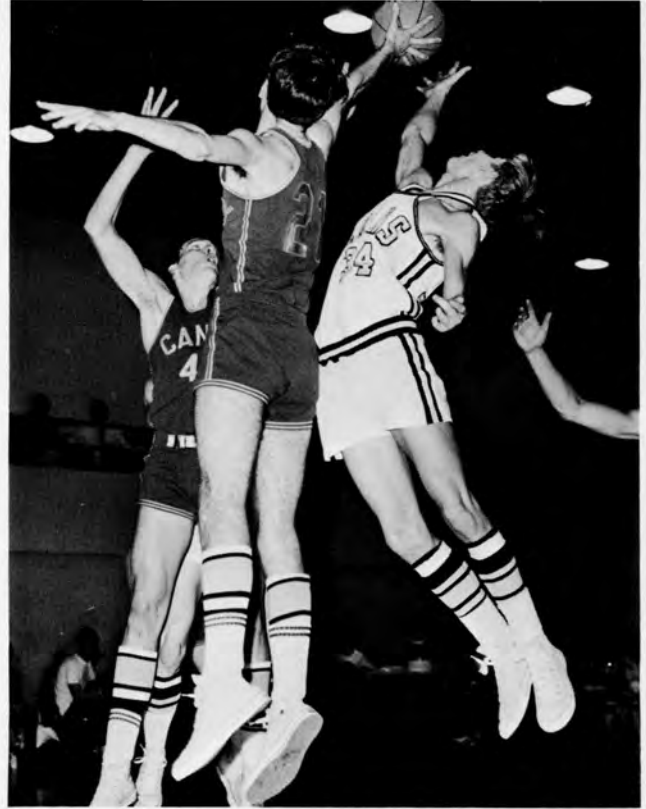

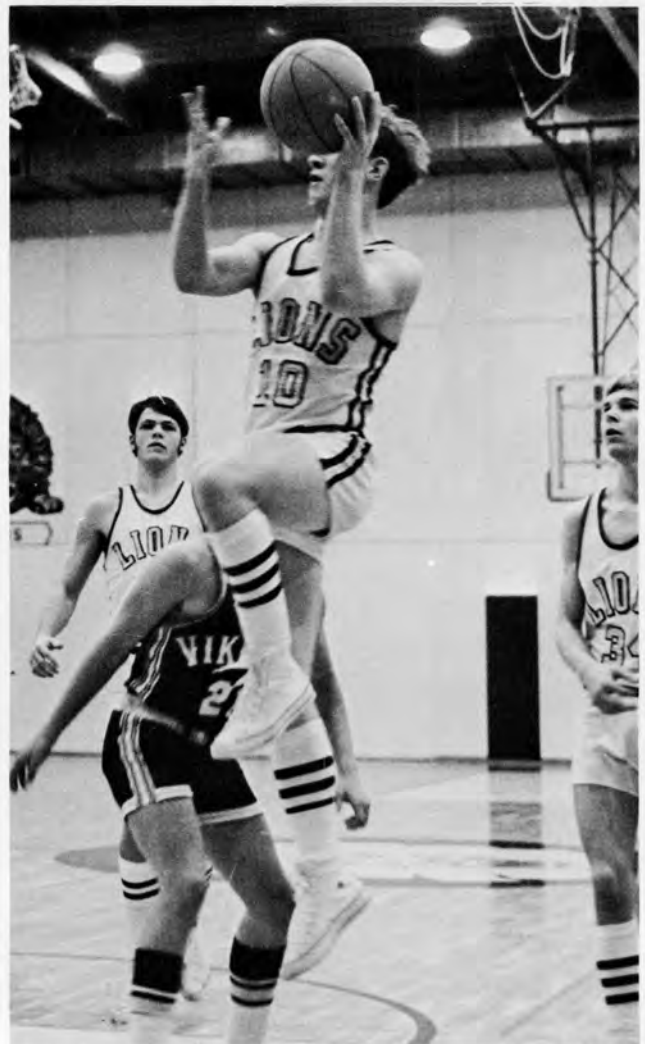

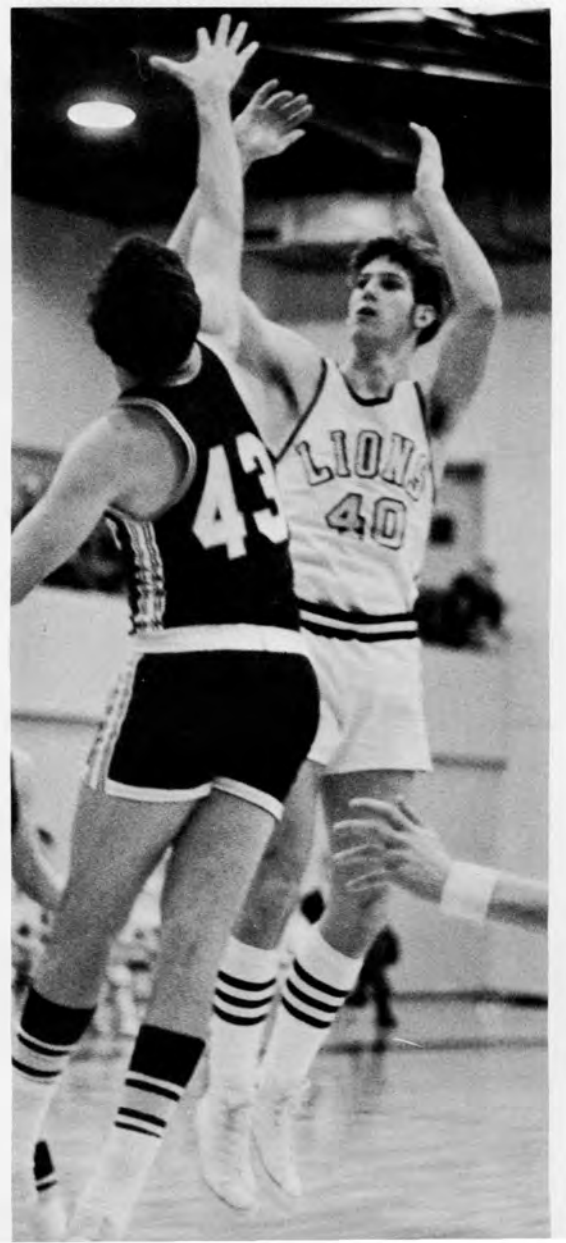

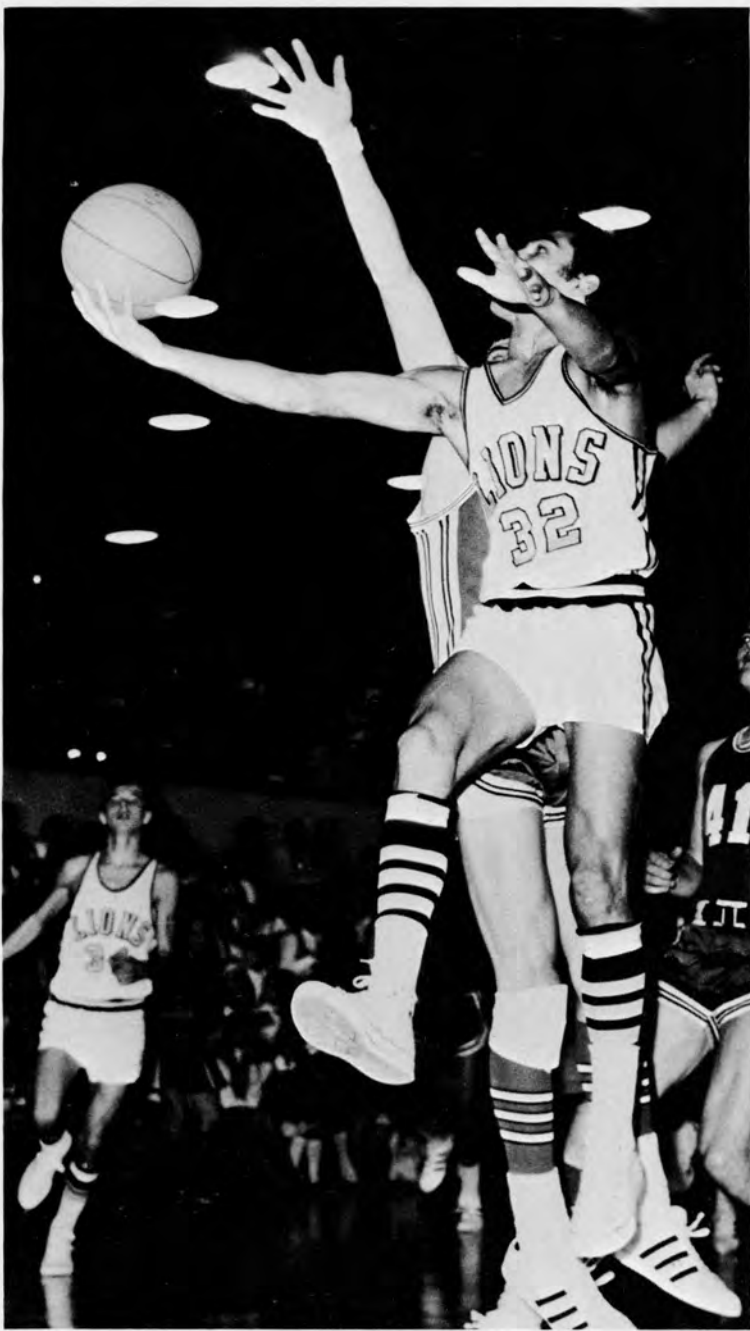

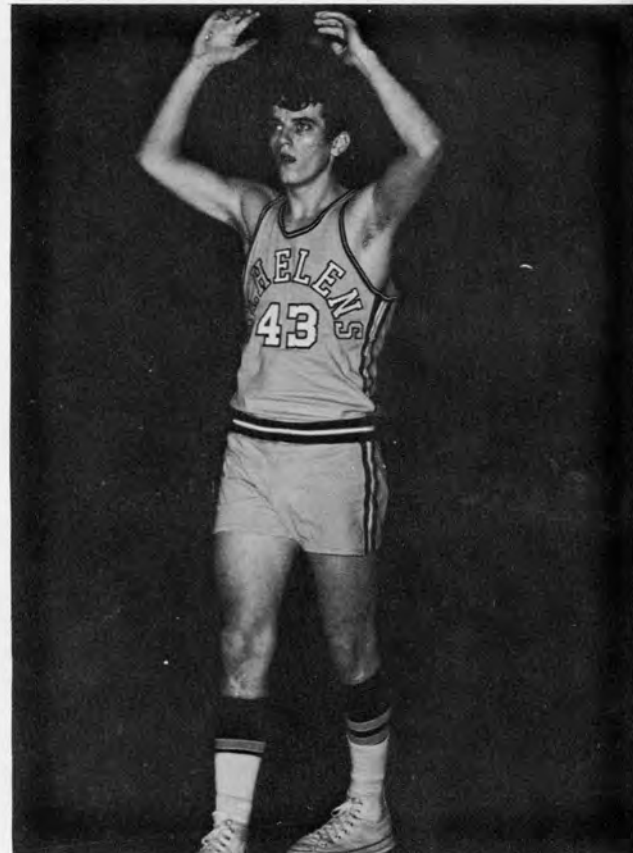

With the loss of the nucleus of the team through graduation, and the acquisition of two new coaches, the Lions started the year with little experience, but much desire.

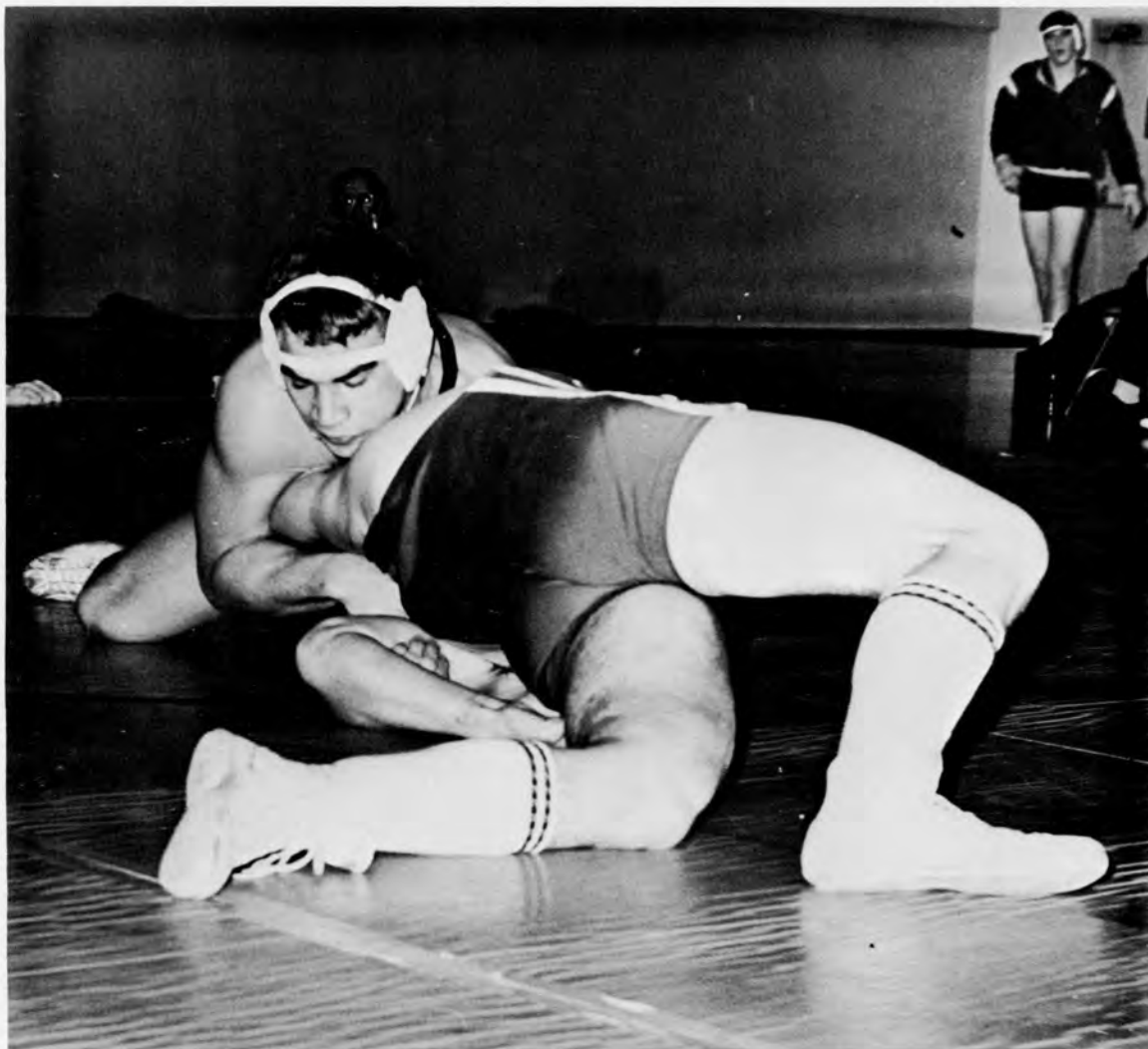

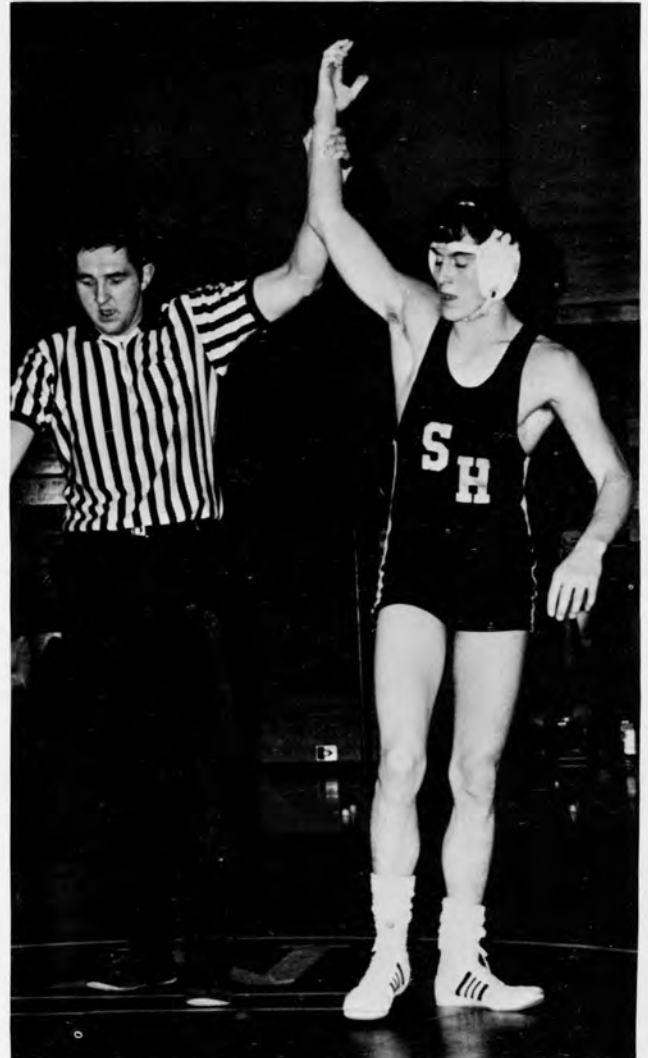

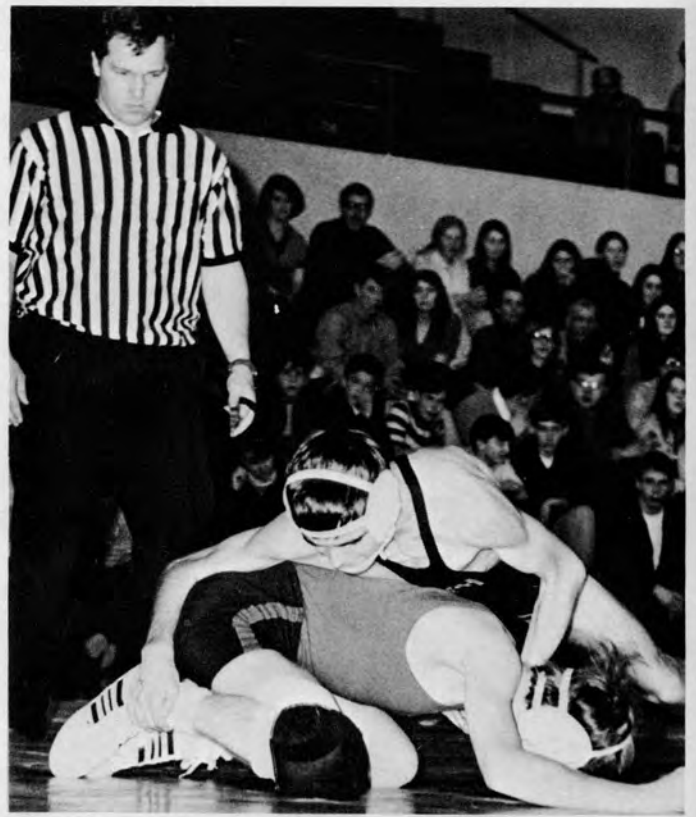

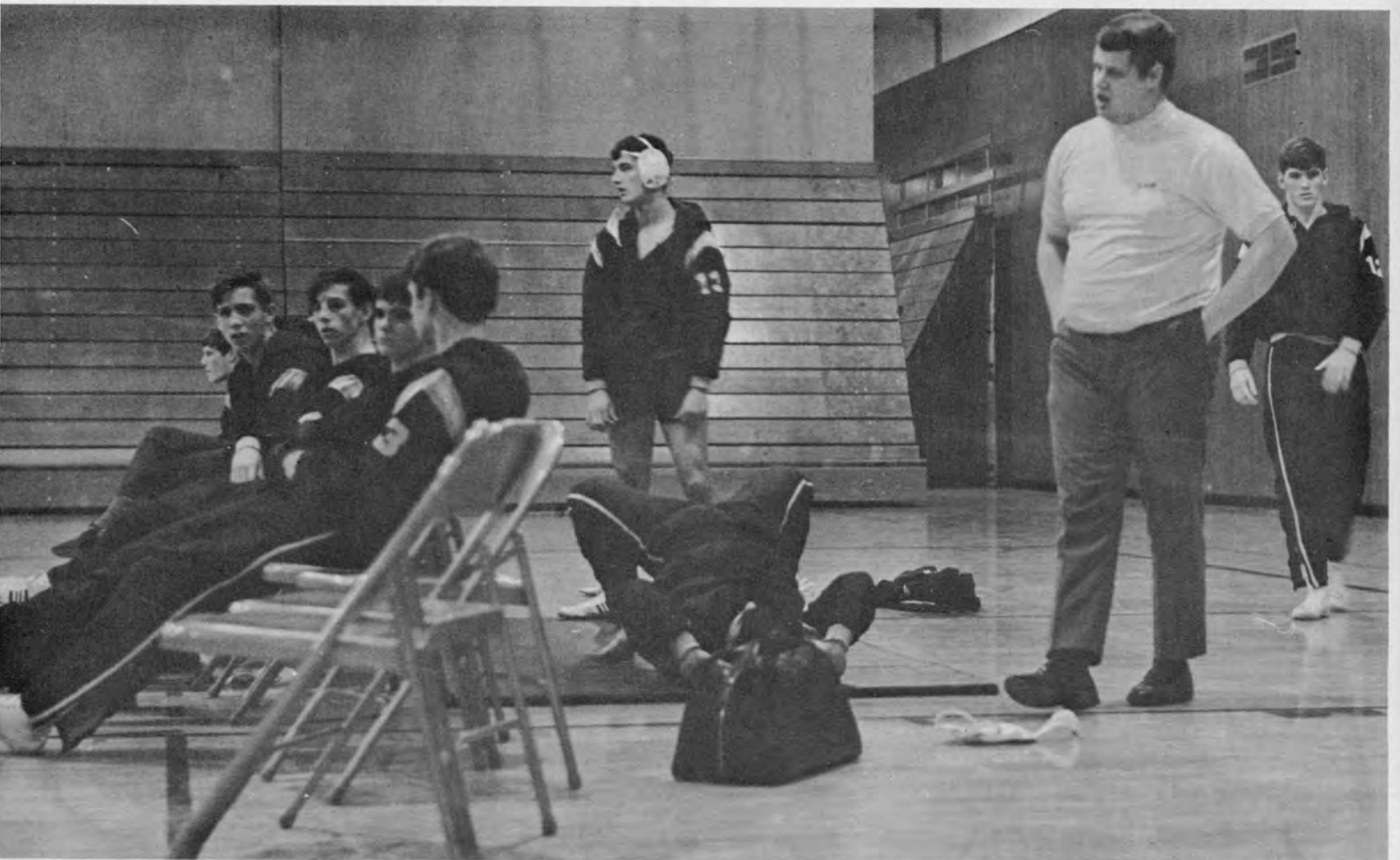

Matmen finish strong in tourney competition

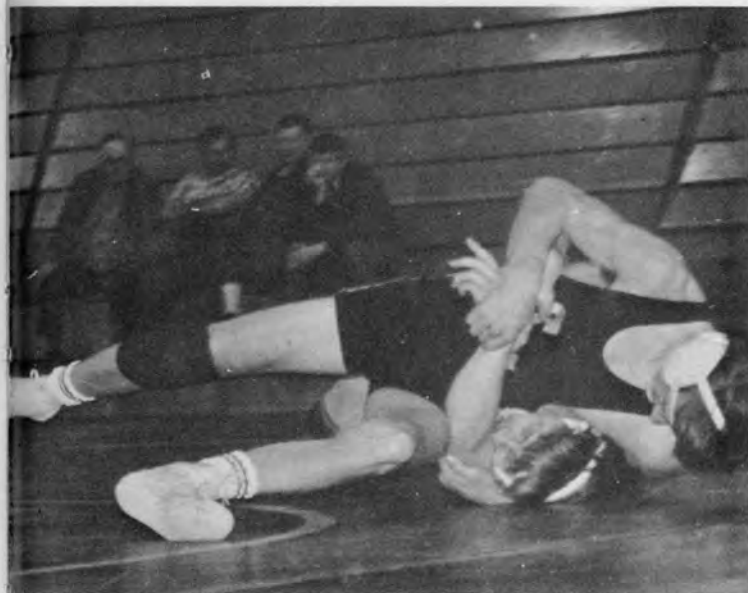

The coaches feel with fifteen to twenty more wrestlers, the team would have been strengthened considerably.

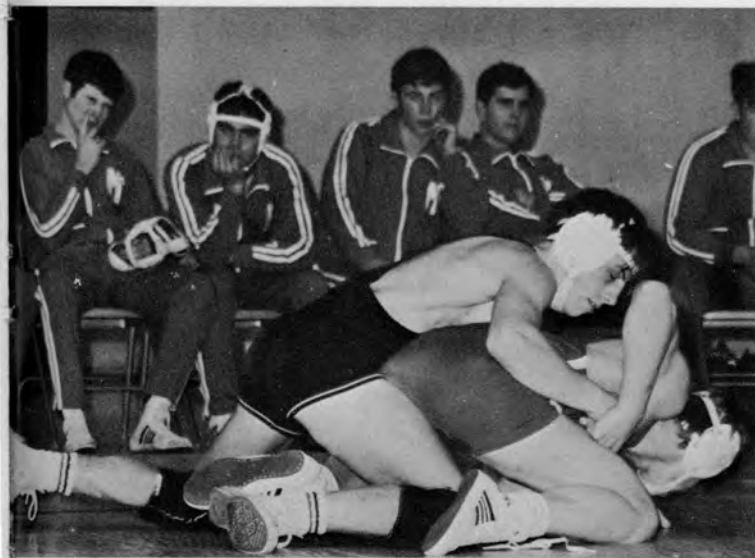
The Lions were young this year. A majority of the grapplers were sophomores and juniors, and with a strong freshman team coming up, we should support a strong wrestling team next year.

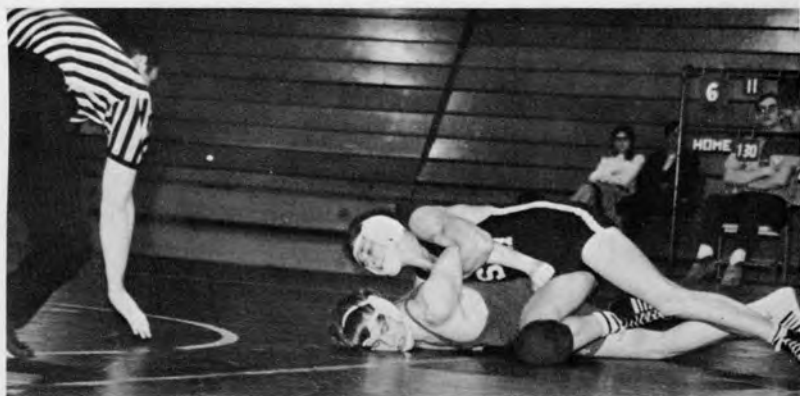

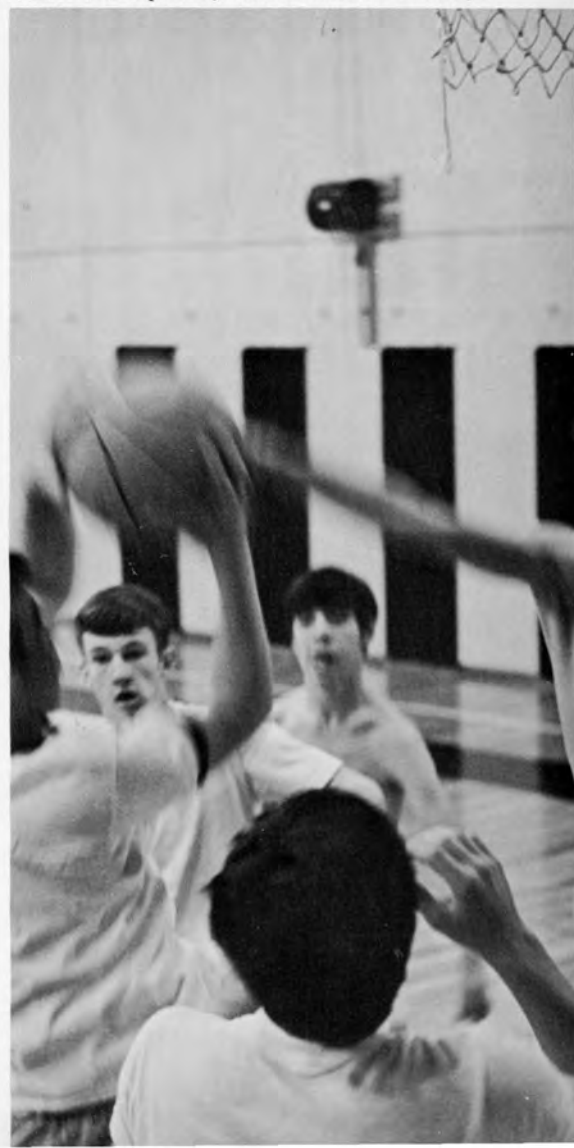

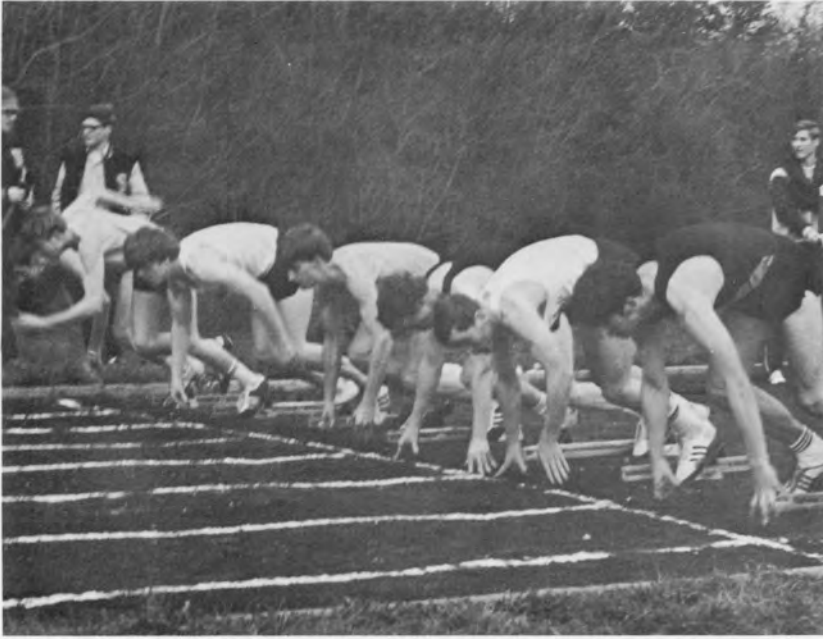

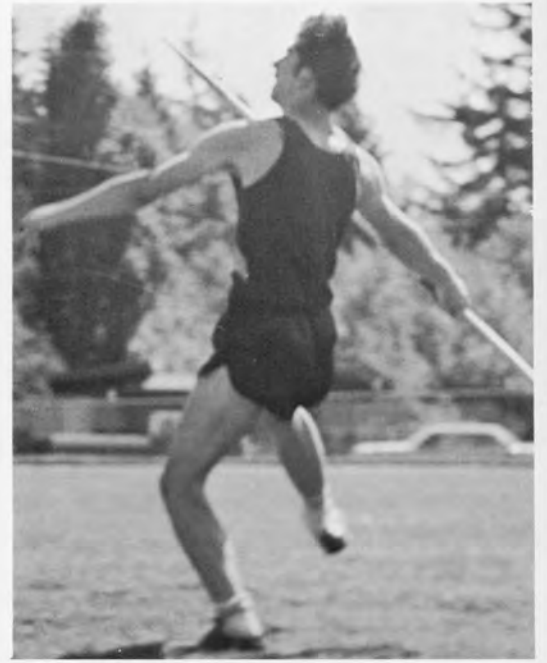

Crown bearers for the event were Matt Wilson and Melissa Monroe.

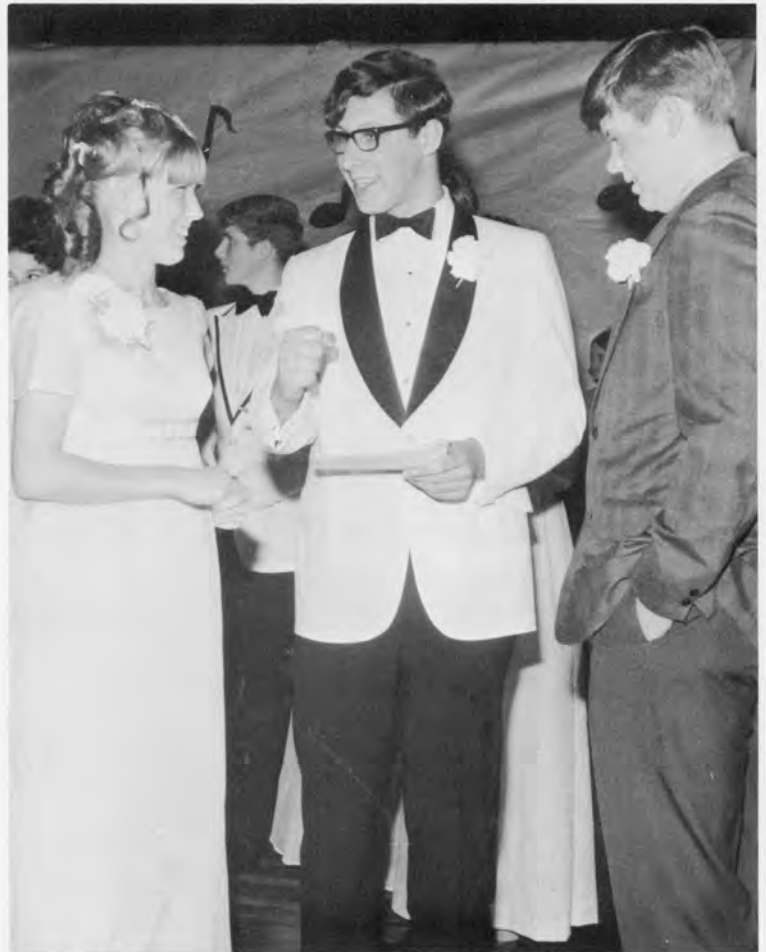

SENIOR BANQUET

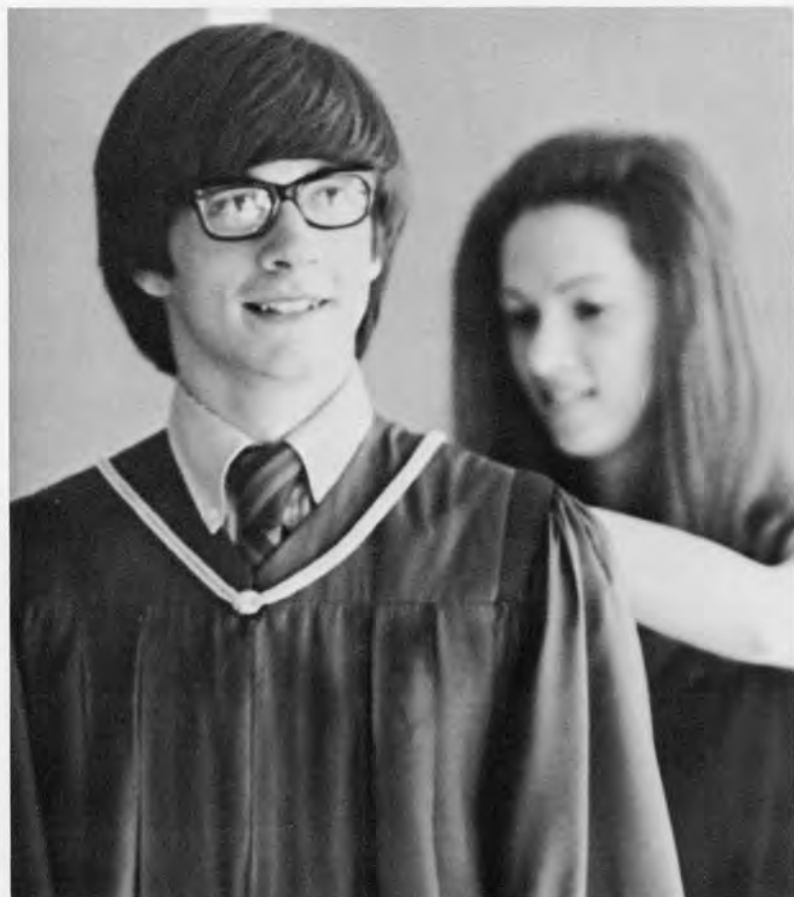

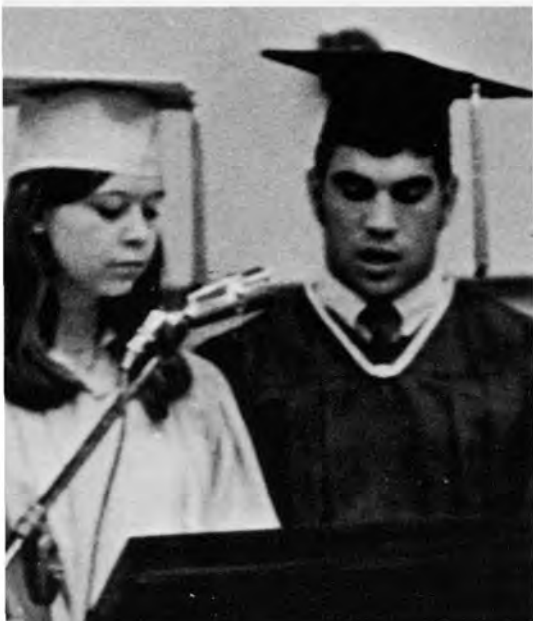

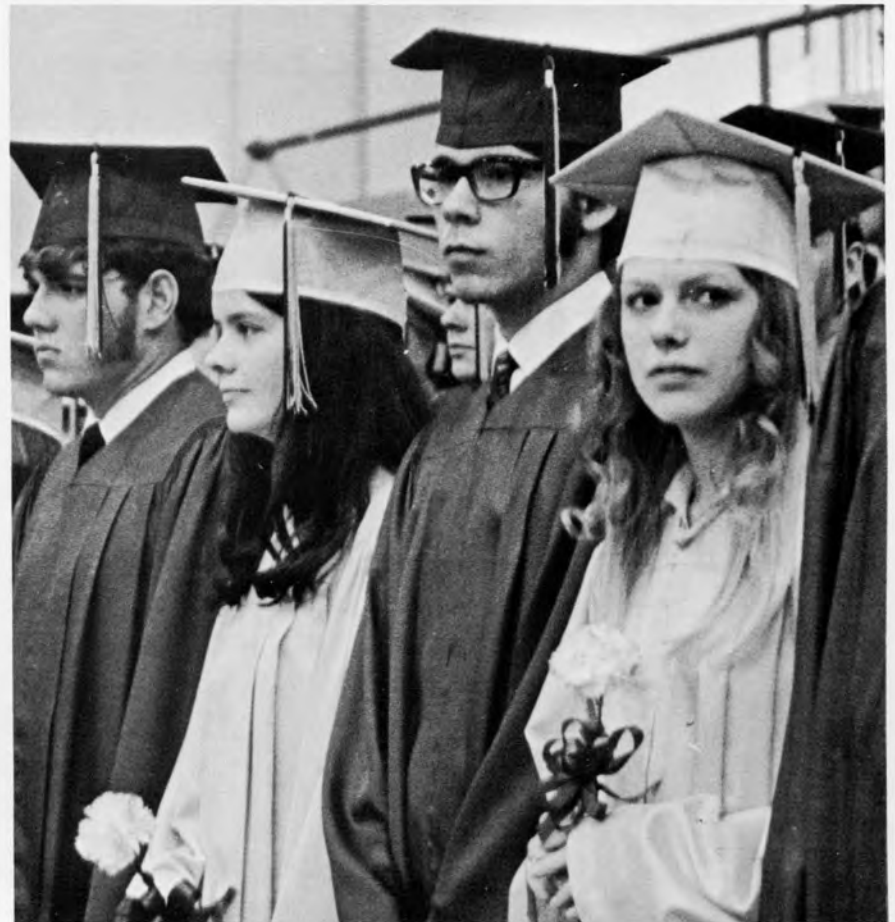
